



About Jamshedpur

The largest urban centre in the state of Jharkhand in eastern India, Jamshedpur extends over the Chotanagpur Plateau in the richly forested East Singhbhum District of the state. It has an average elevation of about 400 feet above

sea level. Surrounded by the Dalma Hills, the city is spread across 64 square kilometers. It is bordered on the North by the river Subarnarekha and on the East by the river Kharkai. The densely forested Dalma hills form the main range, running west to east. At a distance of 10 kilometers from Jamshedpur is the Dalma Elephant Sanctuary.

The vision of the Founder of the Tata Group and Indian industry, Jamsetji Tata gave birth to modern India's first planned city. Jamshedpur was created over 100 years ago - in 1907 - along with the Tata Steel Works, Asia's first integrated steel plant, at the village of Sakchi. Today Tata Steel Limited is among the ten largest steel producers in the world.

Jamshedpur Utilities & Services Company Limited (JUSCO) is India's first and only comprehensive urban infrastructure service provider in the private sector. What's Special about Jamshedpur

Centre For Excellence (CFE): With a distinction of being the first business archives in India, CFE provides a keen historical perspective to the journey of the industrial house.

Tribal Culture Center (TCC): It was established to preserve, rejuvenate and showcase the dwindling culture of the tribes.

Tagore Society: The Rabindra Bhawan imparts training to the students in fine arts, music, dance and crafts.

Coin Collector's Museum: An amateur numismatics' society, it is located at Sakchi. From the arty archives of coins from ancient, medieval and Islamic period to rare collections of Assam and Cooch Behari coins, the Coin Collector's Museum is a haven for all history lovers.

Laser and Musical Fountain Show: Inspired by the musical fountains and laser shows at Sentosa Island, Singapore, it is the first of its kind in India. The effect of the 96 water jets along with the musical fountains leave the visitors spellbound.

Indian Rose Federation

The Indian Rose Federation is the apex of all the Rose societies in India and is a member of the World Federation of Rose Societies. It arranges an annual Rose Convention and Rose show for hobbyists as well as for large-scale rose growers in various part of India. It publishes popular articles and research papers on rose cultivation, written by eminent scientists, scholars and professionals attached to industrial houses.

Amidst Nature
